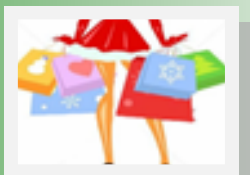


ICD-10 Humor for the Holidays

Below are list of ICD-10 Codes relevant to the festive season:



An accident occurred in a shopping mall? Use ICD-10 code **Y92.513** for “shop (commercial)”

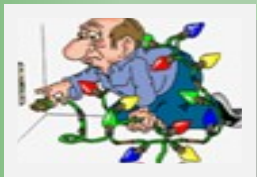


Alcohol impairs the ability to coordinate movements and that increases the risk of slip and fall on ice. Use ICD-10 code **W00.9XXA** for “unspecified fall due to ice and snow, initial encounter”.



People often cut themselves with paper while wrapping presents or decorating the house for Christmas. When they visit your doctor with a paper cut, report ICD-10 code **W45.1** “*paper entering through skin*”.

Every year, about 1,000 people injure themselves while decorating the Christmas tree with stars, lights and other electrical objects. Report ICD-10 code **T75.4XXA** for “electrocution, initial encounter”.



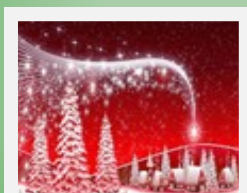
Rich food, too much alcohol and too many cookies may lead to indigestion or heartburn after a Christmas party. Use ICD-10 code **R11.0** for “nausea NOS (without vomiting)”.



Was the food too hot to touch but too delicious to wait? Report ICD-10 code **T28.0XXA** for “burn of mouth and pharynx, initial encounter”.



On an average, people gain 5 lbs. every year during the festive season, thanks to chocolates, cakes and nuts. ICD-10 code **R63.2** is for “polyphagia”.



It is best to choose Christmas tree decorations that are flame-resistant. Use ICD-10 code **W39.XXXA** for “discharge of firework, initial encounter”.
